

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Bremen Cotton Exchange Update

Supply Chain Laws in the Spotlight – Clear Words at the 11th General Assembly of the Partnership for Sustainable Textiles

Around 125 participants came together on 14 and 15 May for the 11th General Assembly of the Partnership for Sustainable Textiles (PST) in Berlin. The Cotton Exchange has been a founding member since 2014. As a multi-stakeholder initiative with currently 122 members, the alliance unites companies, associations, non-governmental organisations, standard organisations, trade unions, and the German federal government. The Bremen Cotton Exchange was represented by Laura Petersen, Assistant Communication and International Relations.

Gina Burgard, Head of the Partnership Secretariat, opened the event with a review of the past year and an outlook on the future of the Partnership. Political and economic framework conditions have changed significantly in recent years. Against this backdrop, it has become increasingly important for the organisation's working methods to take into account the perspectives of rights holders, employees and civil society. The following day, participants had the opportunity to engage in dialogue



with Dr Bärbel Kofler, Parliamentary State Secretary at the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ), in an open forum. The dialogue focused on the debate surrounding legal requirements and regulations, such as the German Supply Chain Act and the EU Supply Chain Directive (CSDDD). Dr Kofler emphasised the importance of recognising the difference between deregulation and the desired reduction in bureaucracy.

The dialogue was followed by a keynote speech from Delara Burkhardt, an SPD (Social Democratic Party of Germany) Member of the European Parliament who joined virtually and provided further political input. She emphasised that the simplifications proposed in the EU's omnibus package could result in the undermining of key sustainability legislation.

Statistics on raw cotton imports into the Federal Republic of Germany will be continuously published in a different way. The countries India, Turkey and Pakistan deliver only small amounts of raw cotton to Germany; nevertheless, the Statistisches Bundesamt (Federal Statistical Office) misleadingly registers them as suppliers of raw cotton imports. In fact, they deliver mainly comber waste and linters. Due to these reasons we adjusted this statistic regarding these three countries. The figures in pale letters are those published by the Federal Office. Data that the Bremen Cotton Exchange considers correct is printed in fat letters.
