BREMEN COTTON EXCHANGE UPDATE

The Bremen Cotton Exchange Supports the Harmonisation of African Cotton Standards

The Bremen Cotton Exchange (BBB) was invited by the African Cotton Association (ACA) to participate as an observer in the revision of African cotton standards in Bouaké. Côte d'Ivoire. The aim of this was to raise the BBB's international profile on the African continent, strengthen networks, and contribute to the technical recognition of the new standards. Jens Wirth, Managing Director, and Tenivoungognon Soro, Assistant Cotton Quality & Rules, represented the Bremen Cotton Exchange.

The harmonisation process involved comparing the national standards of the member states with the newly developed transnational ACA standards. Classification centres from various countries sent

delegations that brought complete sets of their national standards and received the new ACA standards in return. This direct comparison served to align national sales qualities with the new continental reference system.

The project was supported by international organisations and companies such as the International Cotton Association (ICA), Cargo Control, Better Cotton, FAIR COTTON and AFCOT. The BBB introduced the ICA, represented by Robert Jiang, to the event. Therefore, ICA Bremen GmbH, the joint venture between ICA and BBB, was also adequately represented.

Alongside a comprehensive work programme and technical presentations, the event offered an opportunity for in-depth discussion. The highlight was the adoption of the final report containing a new comparative table for 2025.

The BBB was also invited to take a tour of the RTI Bouaké studio, a public television station in Côte d'Ivoire. This resulted in two recorded interviews with Jens Wirth.

You received the Table of Matching Country Sales Types to the African Cotton Lint Standard Range (2024) with the mailing of the Bremen Cotton Report. All major cotton producing countries produce reference samples of the predominant cotton varieties and corresponding grades in their country. These




are called standards. They serve as reference material for comparative quality assessment. From this assessment, a value determination is derived that affects the price of the raw material. The US standards are most commonly used, as they are widely internationally recognized. Standards from about 40 cotton producing countries are stored in the Bremen Cotton Exchange and can be used as comparative material in case of disputes. For all common standards, cotton organizations such as the BBB provide value differences.

Trainees Visited the Bremen Cotton Exchange

A group of business trainees from the vocational college Paul-Spiegel-Berufskolleg in Warendorf, Germany, visited the Bremen Cotton Exchange. The aspiring merchants, some of whom specialised in textiles, were given a guided tour of the historic building and gained valuable insights into the world of cotton and international commodity trading.

Elke Hortmeyer (Director of Communications and International Relations) and Tenivoungognon Soro (Assistant Cotton Quality & Rules) introduced the visitors to the many facets of the cotton industry. Topics such as quality testing, arbitration, trade, and the benefits of natural fibres were discussed.

The historical arbitration rooms, in which international disputes about the quality of cotton are still settled today with the help of comparative samples, attracted particular interest. The trainees took the opportunity to ask questions and gain a direct insight into the practice of the global cotton industry.

With this visit, the Bremen Cotton Exchange is supporting the goal of making economic relationships tangible for young people and at the same time raising awareness of natural fibres.
